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## National Endowment for the Humanities Terminates General Operating Grant for Oklahoma Humanities

OKLAHOMA CITY (April 3, 2025) — At the direction of the Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE), all 56 state, jurisdictional, and territorial, humanities councils, including Oklahoma Humanities, received termination of general operating support grant notices from the National Endowment for the Humanities late last night.

As the nonpartisan, nonprofit state affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities, Oklahoma Humanities annually receives an appropriation from the federal government. On average, Oklahoma Humanities shepherds more than \$250,000 of that funding back into Oklahoma communities by awarding grants to museums, libraries, universities, historical societies, and more.

In 1971, Oklahoma joined five other states in a National Endowment for the Humanities pilot program that established a grassroots network to ensure federal funding reached communities most at need. The pilot was so successful there are now 56 councils across the country. Oklahoma is proud to be one of the first.

For 50+ years, Oklahoma Humanities has administered the distribution of over \$42 million in federal funds from the National Endowment for the Humanities to all 77 Oklahoma counties and all 5 Congressional Districts. Grantees are required to match funds 1:1 in this partnership, fostering local involvement and investments that maximize the efficacy of the programs and the efficient use of government money.

In addition to awarding grants, Oklahoma Humanities also provides three, free programs: *Let's Talk About It*, a dynamic book club celebrating its 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary that brings people together into conversation and contemplation; *Museum on Main Street*, a partnership with the Smithsonian Institution that brings traveling exhibits to rural communities; and *Oklahoma Humanities* magazine, a rich mix of cultures, issues, and ideas.

Oklahoma Humanities has limited information on the immediate ramifications of this termination and will continue, as long as possible, to advocate for providing access to the humanities for all Oklahomans.
