Oklahoma Humanities Grants More Than \$100,000 to Diverse Local Programs

(Oklahoma City—October 1, 2024) – Thirteen cultural and educational organizations from across the state will receive awards totaling \$103,448 from Oklahoma Humanities (OH) to fund important and engaging projects that explore diverse cultural themes and multiple perspectives.

During the highly competitive fall round, OH received 28 eligible grant applications from 26 organizations. "We are excited to support these programs that highlight underrepresented stories, foster learning, and encourage discussion," said Caroline Lowery, Executive Director.
